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Steph Curry: Saving His Team

¹ Stephen Curry was one of the best college basketball players in the country in 2009. (Lots of people call him "Steph" instead of his full name.) Steph knew he was good, but he was still nervous about leaving college to play in the NBA. His father, Dell, played professionally for 16 years, so Steph knew what it took to be successful in the NBA. Dell was an excellent shooter who also made his teammates better. Steph now does the same thing, which has helped his team win many championships.

² Before Steph joined the NBA, some teams thought he was too skinny. They did not think he was strong enough to make it through the NBA's 82-game season. They thought Steph was not as athletic as many other players.

³ That's a reason why six players were chosen before Steph during the 2009 NBA Draft, which is when NBA teams pick college players. The Golden State Warriors were thrilled to see other teams pass on Steph. They gladly chose him with the 7th pick.

⁴ The Warriors were a terrible team when they chose Steph. They had only made the playoffs one time since 1995. During 12 of those 14 seasons, they lost many more games than they won. They knew a talented, hard-working player like Steph was just what they needed to help them win again.

⁵ Golden State's fans were excited too. His jersey sold more than any other player on the team during his first year. Steph had the most reporters asking him questions after many games. Steph played well in his first game in 2009, scoring 14 points and grabbing four steals. A newspaper article after that game said Steph could be the person to save the Warriors.

⁶ He played 77 games and averaged 17.5 points per game during his first season. He made 166 three-point shots, which was sixth best in the NBA. Steph was voted as the second best rookie behind Tyreke Evans of the Sacramento Kings.

⁷ Steph played well, but the Warriors continued losing. They lost 145 games and won only 85 during Steph's first three years. Steph was good, but he was nowhere near as good as he wanted to be. He sprained his ankle several times during his second season. His ankle hurt so badly that Steph had surgery on it during his third season, which caused him to miss 40 games. It would have been easy for Steph to get discouraged after so many injuries and losses.

⁸ It helped Steph to remember the lessons he learned from watching his dad play in the NBA. He knew that succeeding in the NBA was going to take lots of time, perseverance, and hard work.

⁹ So Steph started taking 1,000 shots before practice. He spent lots of time exercising to get stronger. He watched athletes who played other sports. Steph watched a famous football player, Cam Newton, practice during the summer of 2012. Steph learned many

valuable lessons from Cam, who was the leader of his football team. Cam showed Steph how to be more comfortable during games. He taught Steph leadership skills that would help him lead the Warriors to more victories.

¹⁰ All this hard work helped Steph and the Warriors improve dramatically during the 2012-2013 season. Steph had one of the most famous games by any player when he scored 54 points during a game against the Knicks in New York City. He made 11 of 13 three-pointers. Fans of the Knicks were even cheering for Steph during that game because he was playing so incredibly.

¹¹ Steph continued his amazing play all season. He led the NBA by making 272 three-pointers. The Warriors won 47 games and made the playoffs. Fans could tell that Steph was going to make the Warriors one of the NBA's best teams.

three-point shots in one season. They made it back to the NBA Finals in 2016, but lost to Cleveland. Steph was sad that they couldn't win the championship after such an amazing season.

¹⁵ Steph made up for that by leading the Warriors to NBA titles in 2017 and 2018. He averaged over 26 points per game during the 2017 NBA Finals. In 2018, Steph set a record by making 9 three-pointers during one NBA Finals game.

¹⁶ Steph has proven the Warriors were smart to choose a small player from a small college to lead them back to greatness.

¹² The Warriors won 51 games during the 2013-2014 season. Steph again led the NBA in three-pointers. He was voted to play in the NBA All-Star Game for the first time. Over one million fans voted for Steph to start in the All-Star Game.

¹³ Steph's breakout season was in 2014-2015. He set a record for most three-pointers made in one season. He had more votes than any other player to start in the All-Star Game. He led the Warriors to the most wins in the NBA. Steph was voted as the NBA's Most Valuable Player. He finished his dream season by leading the Warriors to an NBA Championship by defeating LeBron James and the Cleveland Cavaliers. It was the first time Golden State won the NBA championship since 1975.

¹⁴ Steph helped the Warriors continue their dominance during the next season. Golden State set a record with 73 wins in a season. He destroyed the NBA record by making 402

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LeBron James: A Basketball Legend

¹ When basketball fans watched LeBron James play in high school, they knew he had the talent to be one of the best players ever. That's why it was no surprise when LeBron decided to start playing in the NBA right after he graduated high school in 2003. (Current rules say that players must play in college for at least one year before joining the NBA. That rule did not exist in 2003.) The Cleveland Cavaliers got to pick first in the NBA draft. Everyone knew they were going to pick LeBron. Fans in Cleveland loved that their new superstar grew up only 39 miles away.

² During LeBron's first NBA season, he helped Cleveland win 18 more games than they won the year before. He scored 41 points in one game against New Jersey. He won the NBA Rookie of the Year Award. He immediately established himself as one of the league's best players.

³ LeBron continued playing outstanding basketball during the next several years, but his dream was to win NBA championships. LeBron made it to the NBA Finals in 2007, but Cleveland lost to the San Antonio Spurs. Cleveland did not get back to the NBA Finals during the next three years.

⁴ That's one reason why LeBron decided to play for the Miami Heat after the 2010 season. People in Cleveland were devastated. The owner of the Cavaliers said some very mean things about LeBron, calling him "selfish" and "heartless" for choosing to leave his home state. LeBron's decision made some people mad, but it paid off for him because he helped the Heat get to the NBA Finals four straight years from 2011-2014. The Heat won the title in 2012 when they beat Oklahoma City and in 2013 by defeating the Spurs. LeBron finally experienced the joy of being an NBA champion.

⁵ Even though LeBron's basketball accomplishments soared in Miami, his heart was still in Cleveland. After the 2014 season, he returned to his home state to play for the Cavaliers. They were terrible after LeBron left, but in his first year back, he helped them get to the 2015 NBA Finals. Cleveland lost to Golden State, but it was incredible how much better the team played when LeBron returned.

⁶ In 2016, he helped the Cavaliers win the NBA title for the first time in the team's history. They had to beat Golden State, which had just set an NBA record with 73 wins during the season. The Cavs fell behind in the series three games to one. Then LeBron scored 41 points in games five and six to help Cleveland tie the series. After that, he played an incredible game seven to help Cleveland win the title. After he won game seven, LeBron cried for several minutes. He was so happy to help the Cavaliers win their first championship.

⁷ LeBron led Cleveland to the NBA Finals again in 2017 and 2018, but they lost to Golden State both times. He is one of the few players in NBA history who has played in the NBA Finals eight years in a row.

⁸ LeBron decided to join the Los Angeles Lakers in July 2018. The Lakers are one of the most famous teams in sports, but they had five straight losing seasons from 2013-2018. LeBron wants to help the Lakers return to greatness.

⁹ Since LeBron has had so much success, people debate whether he or Michael Jordan is the best player ever. He wore number 23 with Cleveland because that's the same number Michael Jordan had during most of his NBA career. LeBron loved watching Jordan play in the 1990s while he was growing up.

¹⁰ LeBron has enjoyed winning many awards, just like Jordan did, but he also enjoys making his teammates better. "I've always loved the success of my teammates more than myself," LeBron once told a reporter. He also said when he was a kid, he had a younger player on his team who could not catch the basketball. So his teammates would roll him the ball so he could pick it up off the ground. When this player finally caught the ball and made a shot, LeBron said, "It was the greatest thing for all of us. And I'll always remember that."

¹¹ He will always remember that moment, just like basketball fans will always remember LeBron James as one of the best players ever.
